Section 2

I. Purpose

The purpose of this release is to provide updated information to social services districts (SSDs) about the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), a program administered by the New York State Education Department (NYSED) that offers the opportunity for low-income children 18 years of age and younger, as well as disabled young adults over age 18 enrolled in school programs for persons with disabilities, to receive free, nutritious meals during the summer months when schools are not in session.

II. Background

Today, while nearly 1.6 million children in New York State receive free or reduced-price school meals for nine months out of the year, only approximately 400,000 children participate in SFSP. The SFSP was created to reduce the likelihood of nutritional risk for low income children during the months when schools are closed for summer recess. By providing free meals at participating summer meal sites such as schools, parks, pools, recreation centers, camps, housing authorities and other neighborhood locations, children can receive the nutritious meals they need. Through SFSP, schools, governments and nonprofit organizations receive Federal and State funds to continue a child's physical and social development with the number of meals and dates varying by site.

Because summer meal sites are selected based on community demographics and pervasiveness of need, any child 18 years of age or younger who comes to an approved open site may receive meals without the need for an eligibility determination to be conducted. Most Summer Meal Program sites are 'open sites,' which means they are open to the community and do not require that children sign up in advance or even 'check-in' at the site. Children and teens must simply show up at the site to get their meal. At camps, children eligible for free and reduced-price meals may receive SFSP meals. Young adults over age 18 who are enrolled in school programs for persons with disabilities may also participate.

Families currently in receipt of SNAP benefits may have their children participate in the Summer Meals program as the USDA Summer Meal Program helps with replacing the meals that the children were receiving during the school year. Summer Meal Program 'open sites', are open to the community. Parents are not required to give any personal information about their children to site operators in order for the child to receive a free meal.

III. Program Implications

Getting the word out to families about Summer Meals is a key factor to ensure that children who rely on school breakfast and lunch during the school year have access to good nutrition this summer. The advertising campaign for this summer's program will begin on June 13, 2016. The SFSP officially ends September 3, 2016; however, most sites close by the end of August.

Local Social Service districts are asked to help increase SFSP awareness by:

- ➤ Posting SFSP information in your lobby using the attached SFSP posters, providing Summer Meal Programs flyers at the front reception desk, and including SFSP flyers in TA/SNAP application packets June, July, and August. - Collaborating with various community based partners, such as your local Nutrition Outreach Provider and area food assistance organizations, to coordinate efforts to increase participation in the SFSP. Flyers, bookmarks, postcards, and more in both English and Spanish, are available to let your community based organizations and SNAP families know about the availability of summer meals and how to find meal locations near them.

OTDA has taken the following steps to increase SFSP program awareness:

➤ All Client Notice Systems (CNS) notices for TANF funded TA households with children and SNAP openings, recertifications, and re-opening transactions include information about the Summer Food Service Program:

Summer should be a stress-free time full of food, friends and fun. Free summer meals can help. During the summer months, children 18 and under can receive free, nutritious meals at Summer Food Service Program meal sites. Many sites also offer fun activities, so kids and teens can stay active and spend time with friends while enjoying healthy meals. Meals and snacks are also available to persons with disabilities, over age 18, who participate in school programs for people who are mentally or physically disabled.
