Teen Works	\$7m (over 3 years)	A dropout prevention program for at-risk youths that provides mentoring and job readiness training.	DOL
Summer Youth Employment	\$35m	Supports summer employment programs for TANF youth and other low-income families.	DOL
Built on Pride (BOP)	\$11m \$6m SFY 00-01 \$5m SFY 99-00	Pre-apprenticeship, apprenticeship and self-sufficiency training programs to prepare TANF eligibles for employment opportunities in the skilled trades.	DOL
Individual Vocational Education and Skills Training (InVEST) Program	\$45.75m \$25m SFY 00-01 \$20.75m SFY 99-00	Provides TANF eligibles training designed to: 1) Help unemployed individuals obtain employment; 2) Help underemployed individuals increase earnings; 3) Help employers meet workforce needs; 4) Strengthen the connection between training programs and local labor market demand. 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Family Loan Program (FLP)	\$.5m SFY 00-01 \$.5m /\$.4m (state) SFY 99-00	Makes small, low interest loans to parents with income below 200% of the federal poverty level to help meet unexpected expenses that could interfere with their ability to remain employed or continue educational pursuits. English Language Instruction	\$8m \$5m SFY 00-01 \$3m SFY 99-00	Non-profit organizations work with local district to provide English language instruction for limited English and non-English speaking TANF eligibles.	DOL
Family Literacy	\$4m	Provides services including workplace literacy instruction and inter-generational education models designed to increase the literacy and work preparedness of TANF eligibles.	DOL
EDGE	\$16.7m	Funds are transferred to SED to support local district designated educational agencies which provide work-based education programs.	DOL
Wheels for Work	\$10m \$5m SFY 00-01 \$5m SFY 99-00	Provides TANF eligibles with assistance to purchase, repair, finance and/or insure personal vehicles necessary to obtain/maintain employment or to participate in other work activities.	DOL
Community Solutions for Transportation (CST)	\$24m \$11m SFY 00-01 \$13m SFY 99-00	Allocations to local districts to provide transportation services for certain TANF eligibles so they can get to and from work or other work activities.	DOL

TANF Transitional Services Block Grant	\$90m	Specialized self-sufficiency case management; additional drug/alcohol and domestic violence; incentives for children's academic achievement/community activity; TOP services.	OTDA
TANF Drug/Alcohol	\$8m	Mandated drug/alcohol screening, assessment and monitoring; enhanced drug/alcohol services.	OTDA
Domestic Violence	\$5m	Mandated domestic violence screening; additional domestic violence non-residential services.	OTDA
TOP (Transitional Opportunities Program)	\$3m (to establish TOP offices)	LDSS may establish a separate office to serve Family Assistance recipients with earned income or whose cases have been closed due to earnings (for up to 12 months).	OTDA
