RECOGNIZING HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Sex trafficking could include:

- A person who is offered a place to stay but is then forced to have sex.
- A massage parlor worker, or other worker ordered to provide sexual services to pay a debt.
- Any minor engaging in commercial sex.

Labor trafficking could include:

- A worker who hasn't been paid and is threatened with falsely being accused of a crime to make them keep working.
- Anyone compelled to work by the threat of physical violence to themselves or their family.
- An employer threatening a worker with deportation if they do not work longer hours for free, or for less than minimum wage.
