

2024 Point-in-Time Count Report

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Balance of State CoC

Background

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires all Continuums of Care (CoCs) to conduct an annual Point-in-Time (PIT) Count of homeless individuals and families on a single night in January. The sheltered portion of the count requires a census of anyone housed in an emergency shelter, transitional housing, or Safe Haven. The unsheltered count includes anyone whose primary nighttime residence is a place not meant for human habitation, including vehicles, parks, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations, or campgrounds. The unsheltered count does not include people who are staying with friends or family ("couch surfing") or those residing in institutions such as hospitals or jails. Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally. The New York State Balance of State Continuum of Care (NYS BoS CoC) conducted the PIT Count on January 30, 2024.

Summary

The NYS BoS CoC's overall homeless count increased in 2024 by 261 people (38%) in comparison to the previous year. There was an increase of 245 people (38%) who were sheltered and an increase of 16 people (33%) who were unsheltered on the night of the PIT Count. Sheltered persons accounted for 93% of the NYS BoS CoC's PIT total (884). The overall increase in the PIT Count is due in part to the end of Emergency Solutions Grants – CARES Act (ESG-CV) programming, which ended in September of 2023, leaving BoS communities with few resources to address homelessness.


People in households with only adults accounted for 65% of the PIT Count (617). The remaining 35% was made up of people in households with adults and children (329). There were 2 people in households with only children accounting for less than 1% of the PIT Count total. The three age groups most represented by the PIT Count were adults 35 to 44, followed by adults 25 to 34, and children under 18. Regarding race and ethnicity, white individuals accounted for 67% of the PIT Count (638) followed by Black, African American, or African individuals accounting for 16% of the PIT Count (148). In Sullivan County there were 97 people, or 66% of the total Balance of State count of 148 people who identified as Black, African American, or African. The largest gender reported was men, composing 55.6% of the count (527). Unaccompanied youth increased by 22 people (51%) from the previous year's PIT Count. Subpopulations with decreases from the 2023 PIT count include chronically homeless adults and/or children decreasing by 63 people (44% decrease) and parenting youth households decreasing by 3 households (27% decrease). The decrease in chronically homeless adults and/or children is in part due to the CoC's data collection method this year by adding further clarification on HUD's chronically homeless definition.








Distribution by County




Distribution of PIT Count census in the New York State Balance of State Continuum of Care.






Cattaraugus County


Cattaraugus County's overall homeless count remained relatively stable in 2024, up four people (6%) from the year prior. Cattaraugus had 63 sheltered persons who accounted for 91% of their PIT total. Cattaraugus County had the largest count of veterans in the Balance of State with eight people accounting for 12% of the total count. The count also revealed 17 adults (31% of adults) with a SMI, 13 adults (24% of adults) with a SUD and nine chronically homeless adults and/or children (13% of adults and/or children). The number of adults with an SMI and chronically homeless adults and/or children remained the same this year from the previous year, while adults with SUD increased by seven people (117% increase).







Changes in Primary Subpopulations




Clinton County


The overall homeless count in 2024 had a large increase, up 132 people (84% increase) from 2023. Clinton accounted for 30% of the CoC's PIT Count. Clinton counted 289 sheltered persons which accounted for 100% of their PIT total. There were 253 people in households without children which made up 88% of the total count in Clinton. There were 45 adults (17% of adults) with SMI, 25 adults (9% of adults) with SUD, 31 unaccompanied youth (55% of people 24 years old and younger), and nine chronically homeless adults and/or children (3% of adults and/or children). From 2023 to 2024, unaccompanied youth increased by 23 people (288% increase), adults with a SMI increased by 16 people (55% increase) and adults with SUD increased by 12 people (92% increase).







Fulton County


Fulton County's overall homeless count increased by 106%, up 52 people from 2023 to 2024. 75 sheltered people accounted for 74% of the county's PIT total. The count revealed 19 chronically homeless adults and/or children (19% of adults and/or children), the same number as the previous year's PIT Count. All 19 chronically homeless adults and/or children were unsheltered. There were no adults with an SMI, decreasing by nine people from the prior year. There was one adult (1% of adults) with SUD, decreasing by 5 people (83% decrease) from 2023 to 2024. There were also 3 unaccompanied youth making up 10% of people 24 years old and younger.




Herkimer County


Herkimer County experienced a marked decrease in its overall homeless count in 2024, down 59 people (63%) from the year prior. All 35 persons were in households without children. There were 19 unsheltered people who accounted for 54% of the county's PIT total, which is the highest percentage of unsheltered people for a county within the Balance of State. Unsheltered numbers increased by 17 people (850% increase) after finding a group of individuals communally living outdoors. There were 14 adults (40% of adults) with a SMI. There were ten adults (29% of adults) with SUD. Lastly, all five of the people who were 24 and younger were unaccompanied youth.


Note: A warming center opened in March of 2023, which resulted in a decrease in the number of hotel placements. Additionally, through connections made with participants at the warming center, a group of individuals were found living in abandoned buildings.







Montgomery County


Montgomery County's overall homeless count decreased in 2024, down 19 people (20%). There were 77 sheltered persons which accounted for 100% of the county's PIT total. There were 54 people in households with adults and children which accounted for 70% of Montgomery's PIT Count. The homeless population was predominantly children in families. There were 33 children under the age of 18 in households with adults and children, amounting to 43% of Montgomery's total PIT Count. The largest subpopulation was chronically homeless adults and/or children with six people, followed by five unaccompanied youth. There were also four adults with an SMI and four adults with SUD. The HUD-funded DV-Rapid Rehousing Program has resulted in a significant decrease in persons residing in the Montgomery County DV Shelter.



Changes in Primary Subpopulations




Putnam County


Putnam County's overall homeless count remained consistent, increasing by only one person from 2023 to 2024. There were 44 sheltered persons in Putnam which accounted for 92% of the county's PIT total. The largest subpopulation was chronically homeless adults and/or children with 11 people, which was down seven people from the previous year. The largest subpopulations following chronically homeless were adult victims of domestic violence (eight adults) and adults with an SMI (seven adults). Three of the 15 people counted under 24 years of age were unaccompanied youth, amounting to 20%. There were no parenting youth households identified in this year's count.







Changes in Primary Subpopulations




Schoharie County


Schoharie County's overall homeless count decreased substantially again from the previous year, by 18 people (38%). The 2024 count is the lowest number Schoharie has seen in the past six years. This is in large part due to the continuation and expansion of services provided by the warming center. The largest subpopulation in Schoharie's homeless population included three adult victims of domestic violence (16% of adults). There was a notable decrease in adults with an SMI, decreasing by six people, or 86%.







Changes in Primary Subpopulations




Sullivan County


Sullivan County's overall homeless count saw a large increase of 168 people (127% increase). The county's numbers increased due to a rise in families that are evicted and the loss of ESG-CV funding. Sullivan had 291 sheltered persons who accounted for 97% of their PIT total. The largest subpopulation was adults with an SMI, where 24 adults (11% of adults) reported having an SMI, followed by 16 chronically homeless adults and/or children (5% of adults and/or children). For youth aged 24 years or younger, 14 people were unaccompanied (14% of youth) and 14 people were living in parenting youth households (14% of youth). Adults with an SMI increased by 12 people (100% increase), adults with SUD increased by nine people (225% increase) and chronically homeless adults and/or children increased by seven people (78%).


