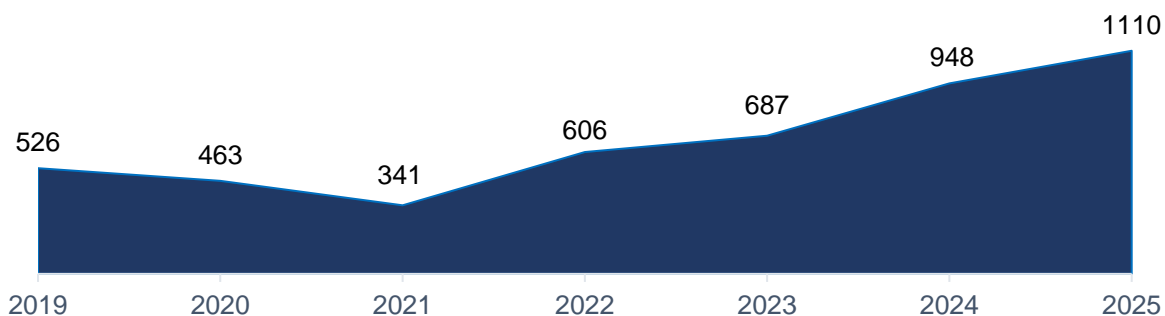
## Background

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires all Continuums of Care (CoCs) to conduct an annual Point-in-Time (PIT) Count of homeless individuals and families on a single night in January. The sheltered portion of the count requires a census of anyone housed in an emergency shelter, transitional housing, or Safe Haven. The unsheltered count includes anyone whose primary nighttime residence is a place not meant for human habitation, including vehicles, parks, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations, or campgrounds. The unsheltered count does not include people who are staying with friends or family (“couch surfing”) or those residing in institutions such as hospitals or jails. Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally. The New York State Balance of State Continuum of Care (NYS BoS CoC) conducted the PIT Count on January 22, 2025.

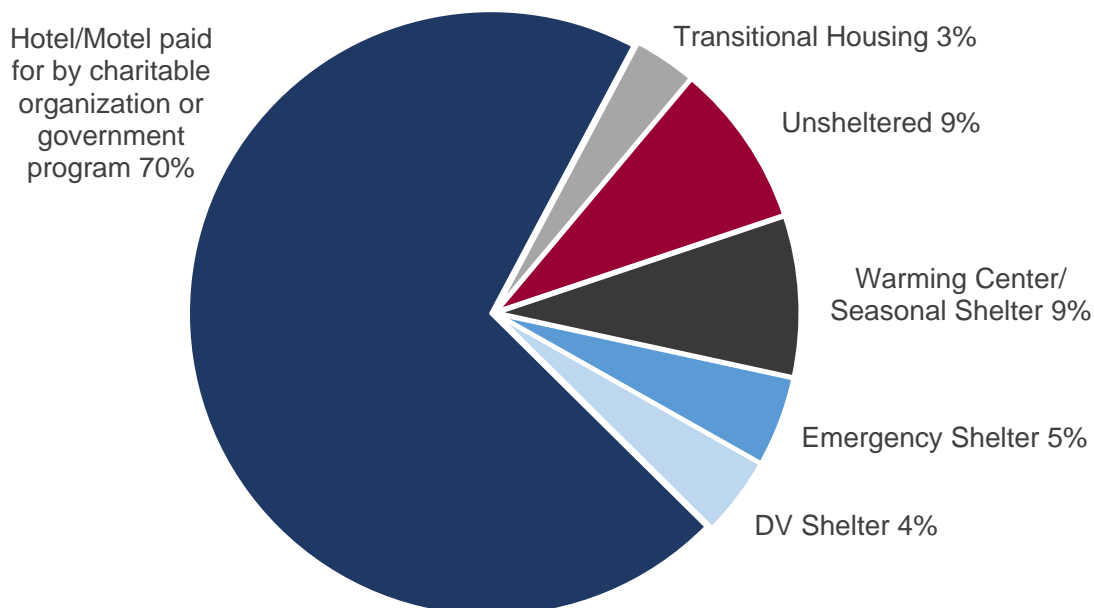
# NYS BoS CoC 2025 PIT Data

## Summary

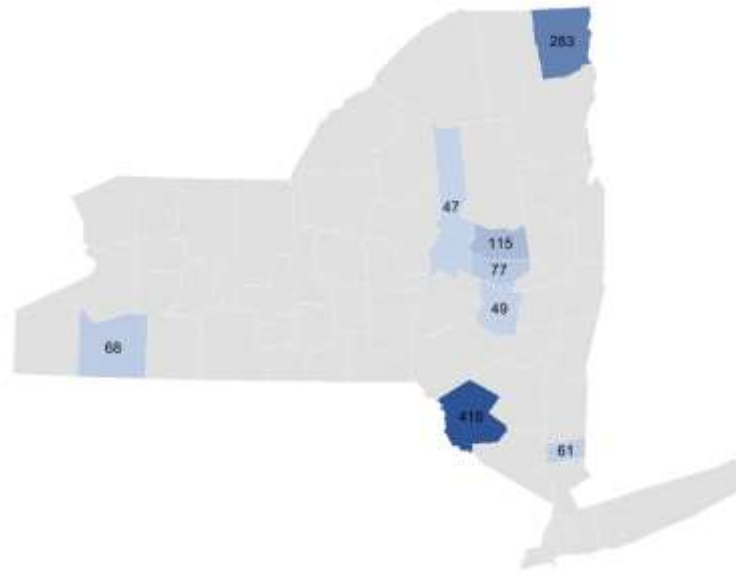
The NYS BoS CoC's overall homeless count increased in 2025 by 162 people (17%) in comparison to the previous year. There was an increase of 129 people (15%) who were sheltered and an increase of 33 people (52%) who were unsheltered (total of 97 people unsheltered). Sheltered persons accounted for 91% of the NYS BoS CoC's PIT total (1,013 people sheltered).

People in households with only adults accounted for 64% of the PIT Count (712 people). The remaining 36% was made up of people in households with adults and children (398 people). The three age groups most represented by the PIT Count were 35 to 44 with 266 people (24%), under 18 with 233 people (21%), and 25 to 34 with 231 people (21%). Most of the adults aged 45 and older were counted in households without children. Regarding race and ethnicity, people identifying as white accounted for 66% of the PIT Count (736 people) followed by people identifying as Black, African American, or African accounting for 15% of the PIT Count (166 people), and people identifying as Hispanic/Latina/e/o accounting for 10% of the PIT Count (114 people). The largest gender reported was men (or boys), composing 56% of the count (619 people). Notable changes in subpopulations from the 2024 PIT Count include unaccompanied youth decreasing by 12 people (-18%), those reporting Substance Use Disorder (SUD) increasing by 56 people (82%) and those reporting Serious Mental Health (SMI) increasing by 49 people (44%) from the previous year's PIT Count.

## Distribution by Program Type

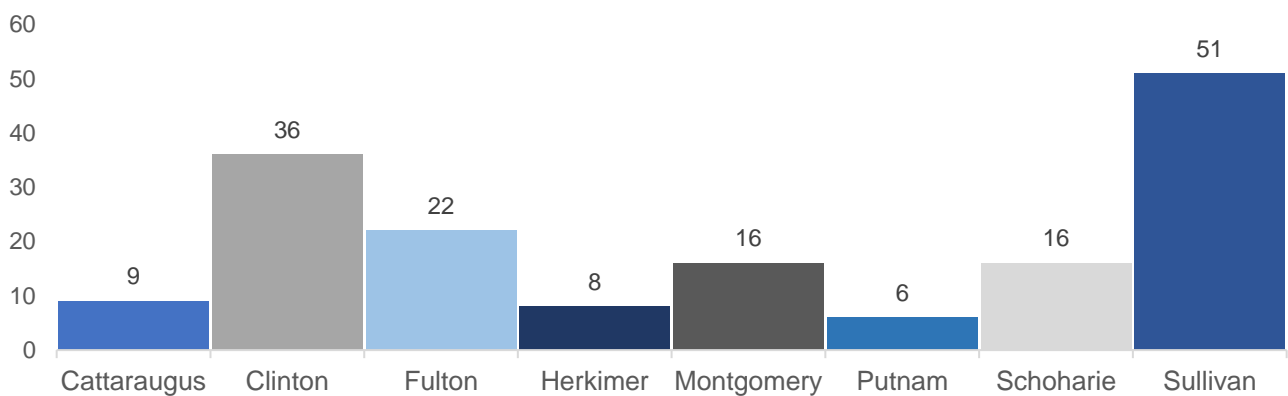


## Distribution by County



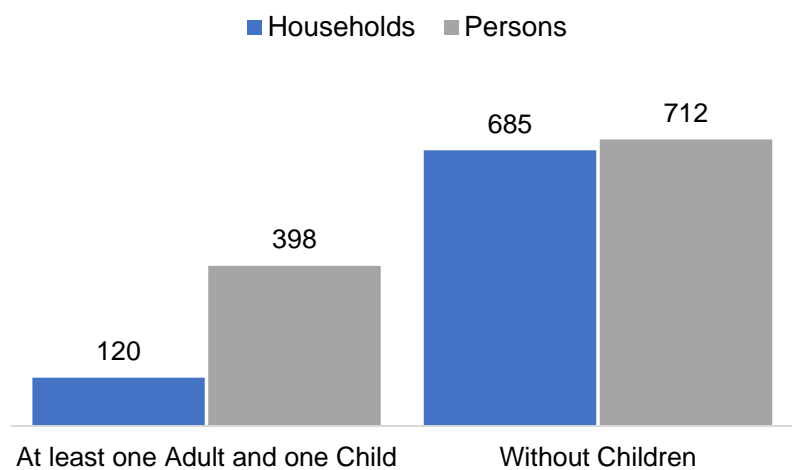
*Distribution of PIT Count census in the New York State Balance of State Continuum of Care.*

## Change in Subpopulation Prevalence Rates

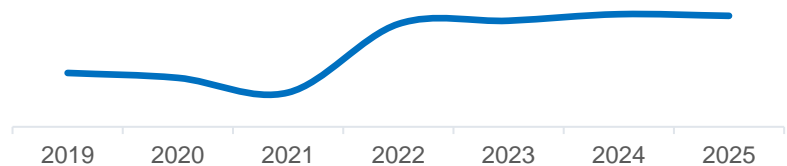


# Cattaraugus County

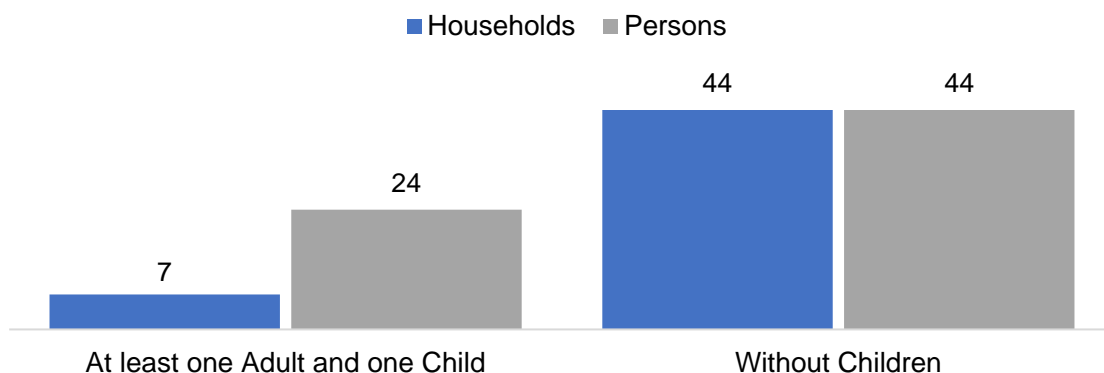
Cattaraugus County's overall homeless count remained stable in 2025, down one person (-1%) from the prior year. Cattaraugus had 65 sheltered persons who accounted for 96% of their PIT total. Cattaraugus County had a large decrease in veterans with 7 less veterans (-88%) experiencing homelessness on the night of the PIT Count. The count also revealed 9 adults reporting a SMI (16% of adults), 3 unaccompanied youth (16% of people aged 24 and younger), and 3 parenting youth (16% of people aged 24 and younger). The number of adults reporting a SUD decreased by 10 people (-77%), and the number of adults reporting a SMI decreased by 8 people (-47%). There was no one experiencing chronic homelessness, down 9 people (-100%) from the previous year.

# Clinton County

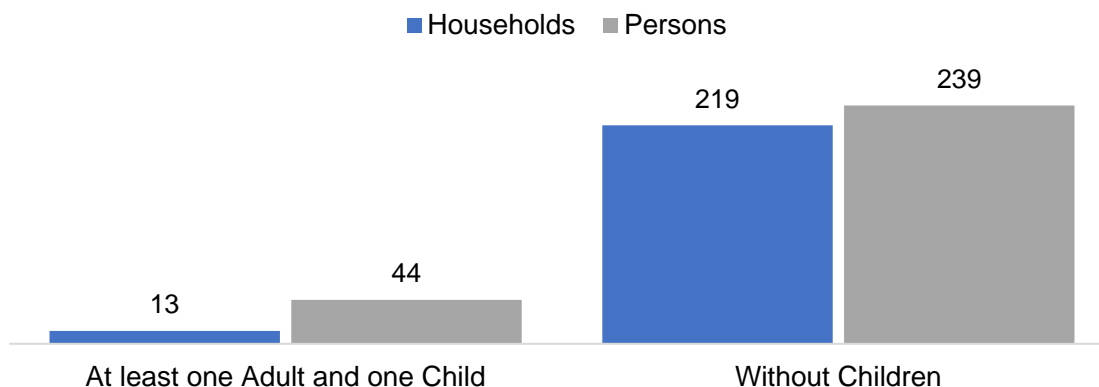
Clinton's 2025 PIT Count was similar to 2024 decreasing by 6 people (-2%). Clinton counted 18 people experiencing unsheltered homelessness, with 11 people staying in a recently closed hotel not safe for human habitation. This is the first time the county identified anyone experiencing unsheltered homelessness. Of the 18 people unsheltered; 16 reported SMI, 13 were chronically homeless, 9 reported SUD, and 1 was an unaccompanied youth. In total, there were 103 adults reporting SMI (40% of adults), 51 adults reporting SUD (20% of adults), and 35 chronically homeless adults and/or children (12% of adults and/or children). Adults reporting SMI increased by 58 people (129%), adults reporting SUD increased by 26 people (104%), and chronically homeless adults and/or children increased by 26 people (289%). Unaccompanied youth decreased by 20 people (-65%).

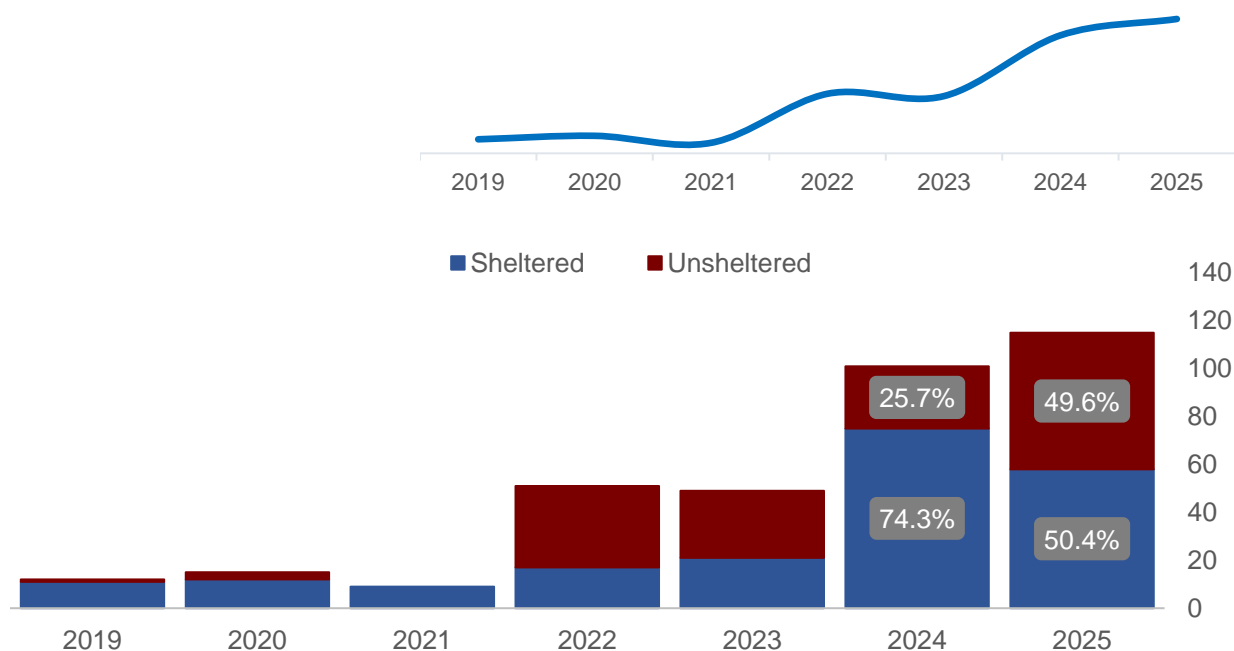
# Fulton County

Fulton County's overall homeless count increased by 14 people (14%) from 2024 to 2025. This was due to an increase of 31 people experiencing unsheltered homelessness (119% increase). Unsheltered homelessness accounted for 50% of the total PIT count. The count revealed 35 chronically homeless adults and/or children (30% of adults and/or children), with 34 being unsheltered; 31 adults reporting a SUD (29% of adults), with 27 being unsheltered; 15 adults reporting SMI (14% of adults), with 7 being unsheltered; and 15 unaccompanied youth (60% of people aged 24 and younger), with 6 being unsheltered. Of the 4 veterans counted, 3 were unsheltered. There was an increase in adults reporting SMI (15 people from 0), SUD (30 people or 3000%), and survivors of DV (5 people or 250%). Chronically homeless adults and/or children increased by 16 people (84%) and unaccompanied youth increased by 12 people (400%).

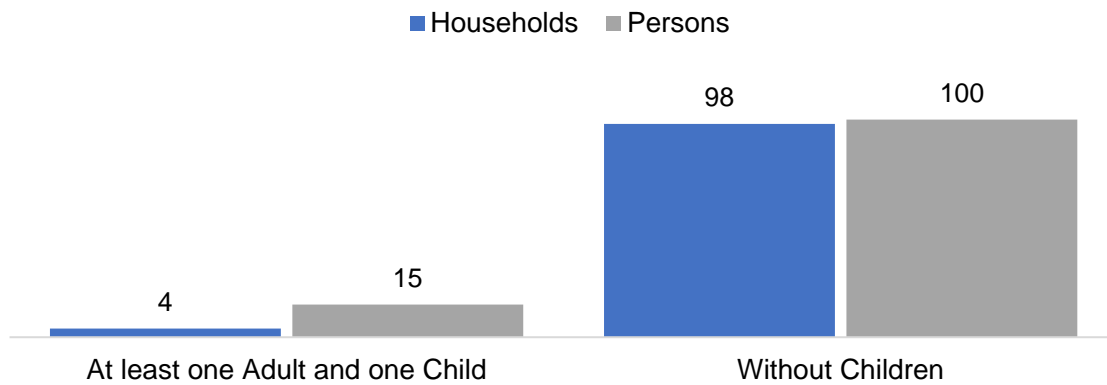

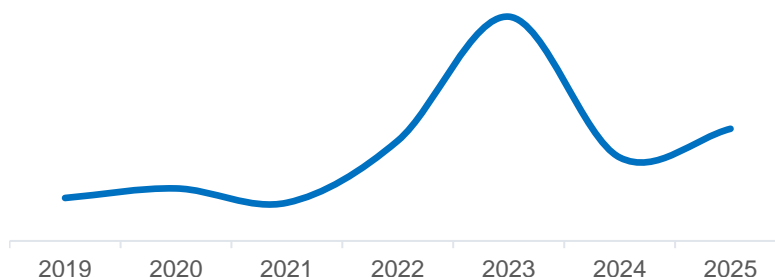


# Herkimer County

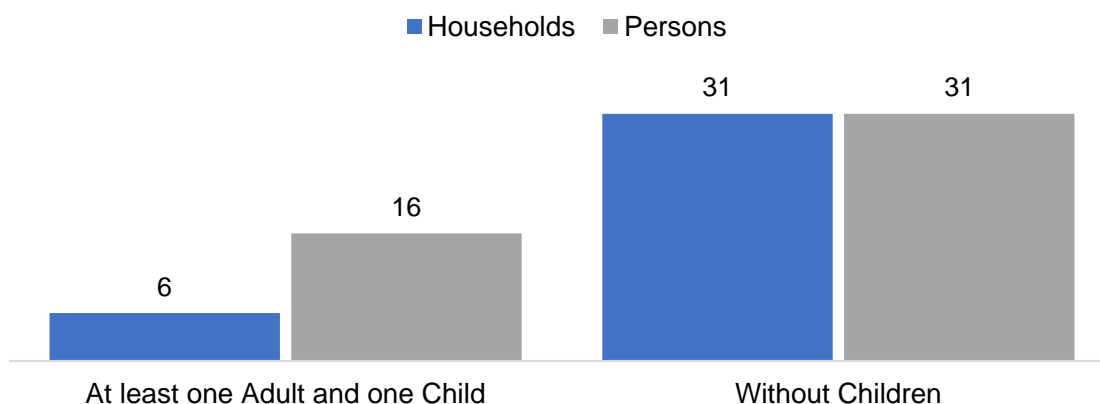
Herkimer County experienced an increase in their overall homeless count in 2025, up 12 people (34%) from the year prior. The number of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness was reduced by 15 people (79%) from the previous year. There were 15 adults reporting a SMI (41% of adults), 8 adults reporting a SUD (22% of adults), and 2 adults who reported having HIV/AIDS (5% of adults). Adults and/or children experiencing chronic homelessness decreased by 7 people (-78%). The number of people in households with at least one adult and one child significantly increased from the previous year. In 2024 the entire PIT Count consisted of people in households without children. This year, there were 16 people from 6 households with at least one adult and one child.

# Montgomery County

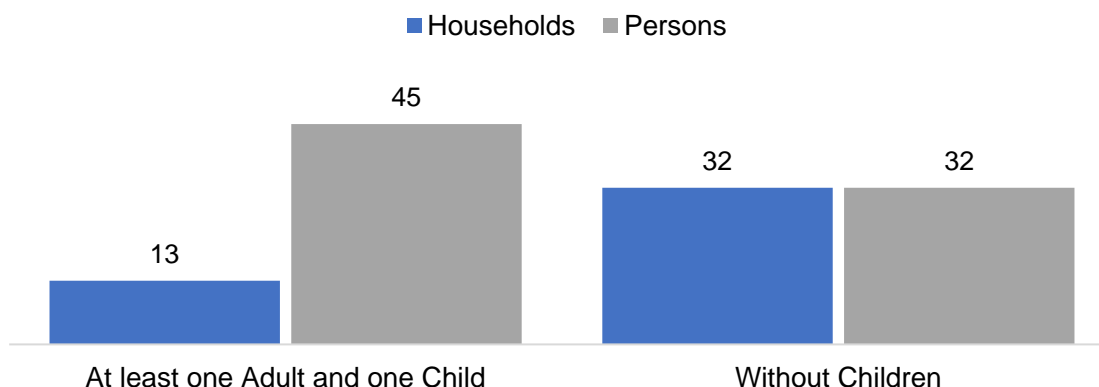
Montgomery County's overall homeless count remained the same in 2025. There were 77 sheltered persons which accounted for 100% of the county's PIT total. There were 25 children under the age of 18 in households with adults and children, amounting to 32% of Montgomery's total PIT Count. Montgomery has a relatively large number of Hispanic/Latina/e/o people experiencing homelessness with 29 people (38%) identifying as Hispanic/Latina/e/o. The largest reported subpopulations were 6 adults reporting SMI (12% of adults), and 6 chronically homeless adults and/or children (8% of adults and/or children). There were also 5 adult survivors of DV (10% of adults), and 4 adults reporting a SUD (8% of adults).

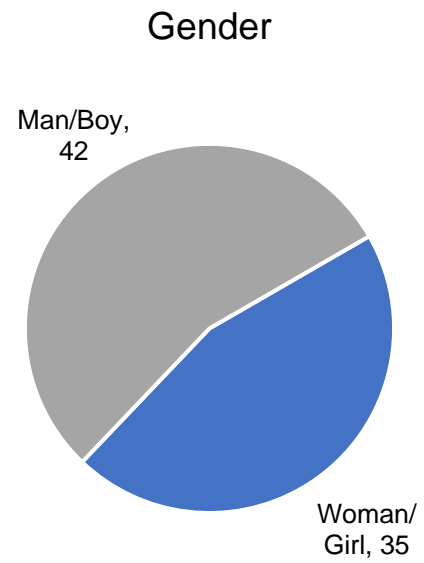
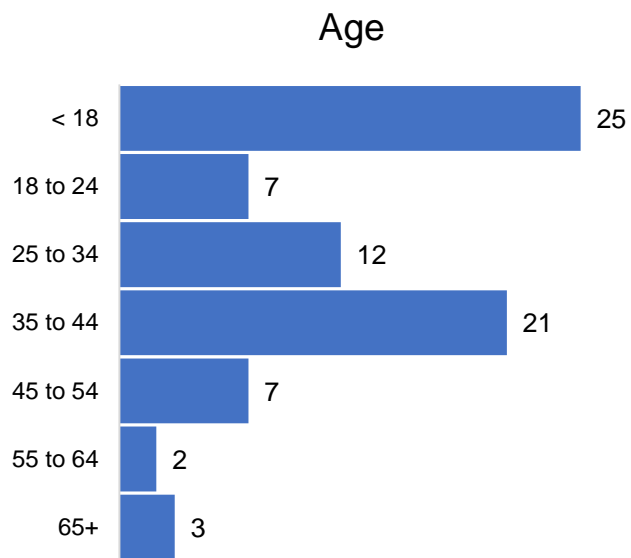

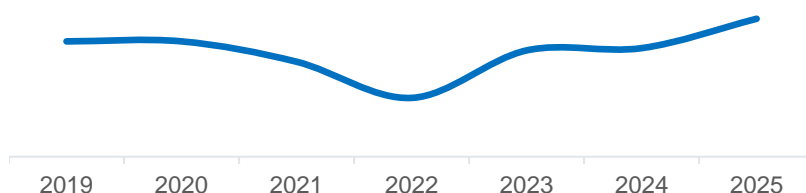

# Putnam County

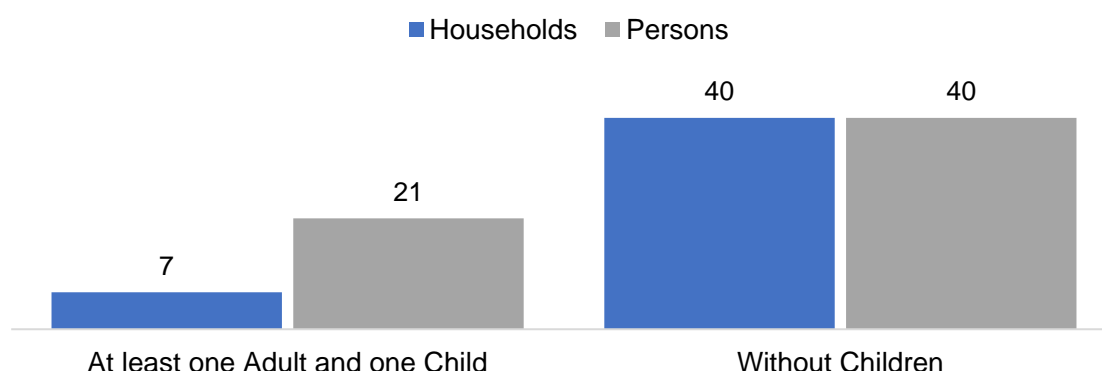
Putnam County's overall homeless count increased by 13 people (27%) from 2024 to 2025. There were 51 sheltered persons which accounted for 84% of the county's PIT total. The unsheltered count increased this year by 6 people (150%). In Putnam, 56% of people experiencing homelessness identify as Hispanic/Latina/e/o. The largest subpopulations were 8 adults reporting a SMI (17% of adults), and 8 adult survivors of DV (17% of adults). Out of the 8 adults reporting SMI, 6 were experiencing unsheltered homelessness. The next largest subpopulation was 7 adults and/or children experiencing chronic homelessness (11% of adults and/or children). Of the 7 chronically homeless adults and/or children, 3 were unsheltered.

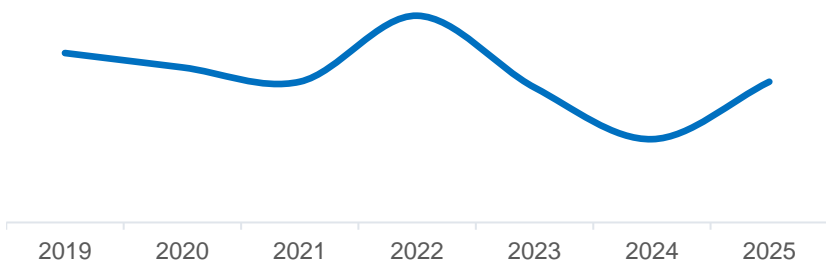


# Schoharie County

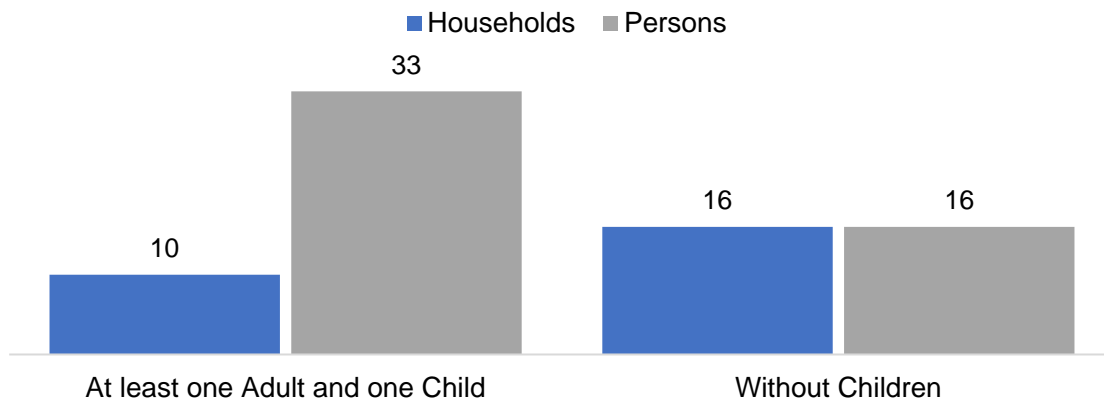
In 2025, Schoharie County's overall homeless count increased by 20 people (69%) after experiencing their lowest PIT count over the past seven years. Most of the increase came from persons in households with at least one adult and one child (14 people). Children under 18 is the largest age group in this year's PIT count, increasing by 10 children (100%). There were 48 people experiencing sheltered homelessness in Schoharie, which accounted for 98% of their PIT count. Adult survivors of DV make up the largest subpopulation in Schoharie with 2 adult survivors (7% of adults). There were 2 chronically homeless adults and/or children (4% of adults/children).

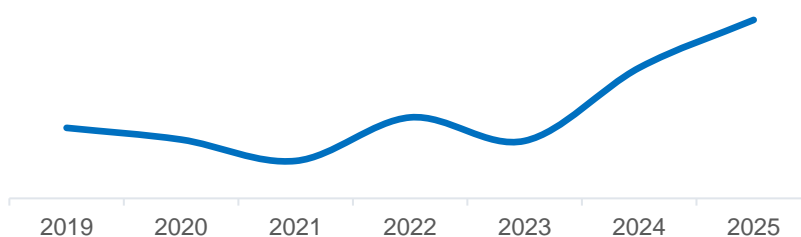
# Sullivan County

In 2025, Sullivan County's overall homeless count saw a large increase of 110 people (37% increase). Sullivan had 406 sheltered persons who accounted for 99% of their PIT total. The largest subpopulation was 25 adults with a SUD (9% of adults). For youth aged 24 years or younger, 18 people were unaccompanied (12% of people aged 24 and younger) and 12 people were living in parenting youth households (8% of people aged 24 and younger). There were 7 adult survivors of DV (2% of adults). Adults reporting a SUD increased by 12 people (92%) and the number of unaccompanied youth increased by 4 people (29%). There was a decrease of 20 adults reporting a SMI (-83%). All 4 of the adults who reported a SMI were unsheltered. Lastly, there was a decrease of 12 chronically homeless adults and/or children (-75%).

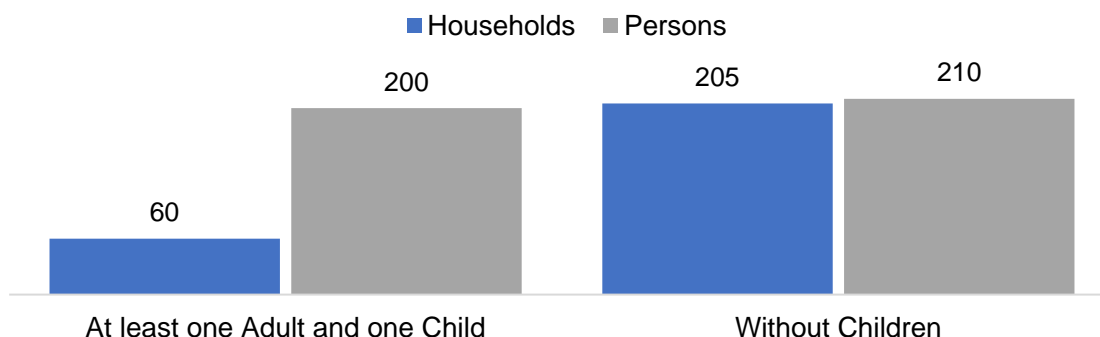

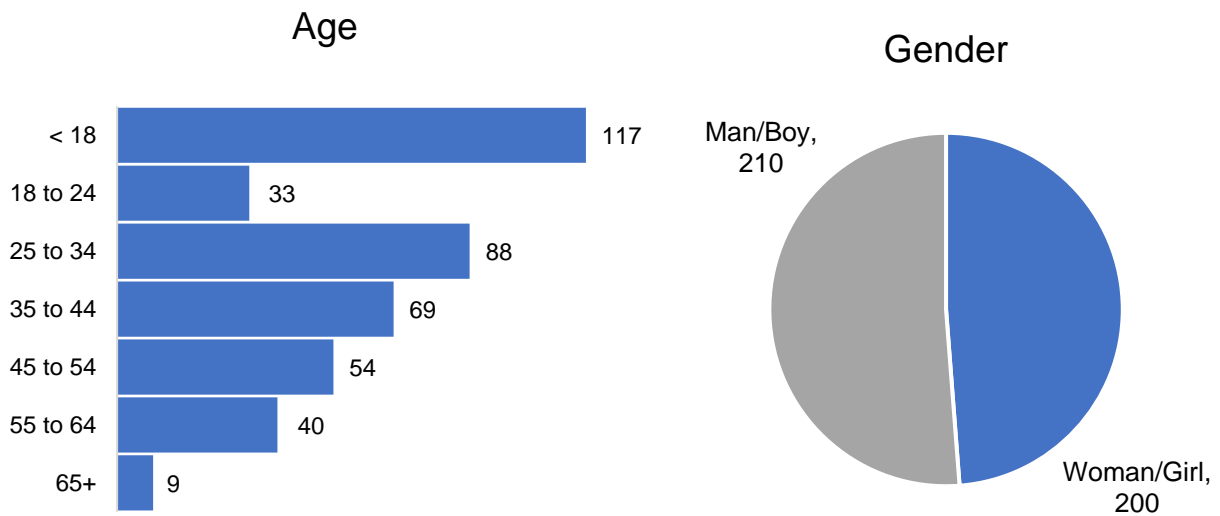

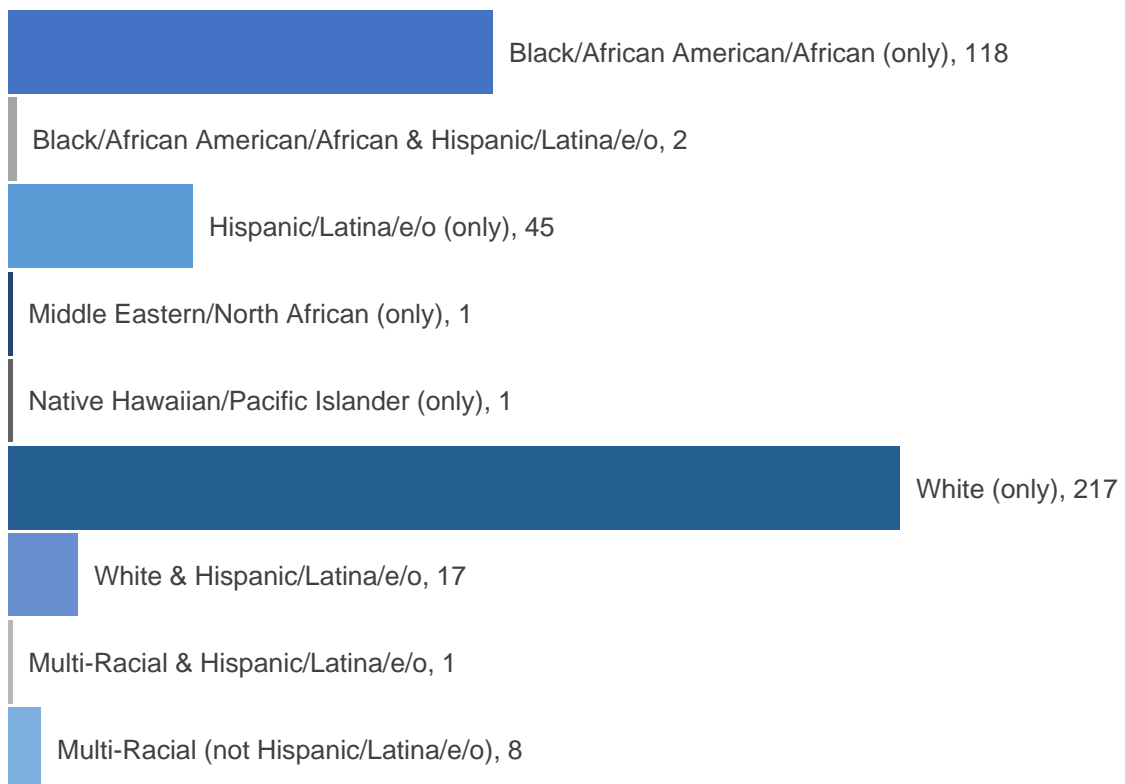
